Geoffrey James Clark of Bourton-on-the-Water died in 2014. He was born in 1946.

Geoffrey Clark (67) died at the turn of the year after a long illness born with much courage and good grace. He had been a ringer for almost 60 years, having joined the tower at Barnwood as a young lad in the 1950s. His sister, Peggy, was already a member of the predominantly young band, which was bolstered by a few pre-war ringers. Geoff was later to become a popular tower captain and church warden at Barnwood.

It was through ringing that Geoff met his wife Anne, as she was tower secretary at Haresfield whilst he held the same role at Barnwood. In those days the two towers were socially very close. Geoff was also a founder member of the Barnwood Handbell Ringers. It was while ringing handbells in the 1970s that Geoff first experienced the difficulties with his wrists which led to a diagnosis of rheumatoid arthritis and the beginning of his long illness.

Geoff, Anne and Roger moved to Bourton-on-the-Water in 1982, where Geoff was employed by Lloyds Bank; Andrew was born soon afterwards. They all became much involved in the life of the village. The local scout troop was a particular interest of Geoff's (he had joined the cubs in Barnwood in the early 1950s), as was the tower. Geoff became treasurer of a number of organisations including The Friends of Bourton Hospital. He was instrumental in encouraging the newly formed team at Great Rissington when the bells were rehung there in 1991. All the while his illness was taking its toll, so much so that he was compelled to retire at the early age of 50. This did not prevent him from trying to keep his involvement with local organisations and charities. In fact he was still tower secretary at the time of his death despite not having been able to go up the tower for a number of years. For some time he acted as independent examiner for the Gloucester and Bristol Association and, in his modest way, felt much honoured when he was elected as an Honorary Life member. He was delighted that his son, Andrew, took up ringing and went on to become a really proficient ringer.

He had a good sense of humour but the feature of his character which shone the brightest was his warmth and friendship. He was an extremely generous man with a genuine concern for the wellbeing of others. He never had a bad word to say about anyone; he was man who inspired real and rare affection and respect. In fact Steve Coleman summed it up so well on Campanophile after the quarter peal at Bourton (in which Andrew rang) when he wrote "In grateful thanksgiving for the life of Geoff Clark, a thoroughly nice man." Rupert Duester of Great Rissington died on 9th January 2014.

Rupert was born in May 1936 and lived his whole life in Great Rissington, apart from 2 years in Cyprus doing National Service with the RAF. He was involved in most village activities and events throughout his life, especially cricket and football in his earlier days.

When the church bells were declared unsafe for ringing in 1950 he was one of those who chimed the Tenor before services. When the bells were refurbished and rehung in 1991 it was no surprise that he was one of the group which volunteered to learn bell-handling for full-circle ringing. He rarely missed a practice or a service ring, though he was always happier as a solid and steady tenor man than struggling with method ringing. His conscientious approach and boyish humour were greatly valued by the band. For 20 years he acted as steeple-keeper. His meticulous care of the bells and ropes earned many awards in the old 'Best-kept Tower' competition and won plaudits from the Association.

Four years ago he faced his first battle with cancer with great stoicism – and won. Struck down again in December 2012, he again showed dignity and courage as his health steadily deteriorated; he regularly used to say "I'll get back to ringing as soon as I feel a bit better".
